GENOA CHARTER TOWNSHIP BOARD Regular Meeting August 3, 2015

MINUTES

Supervisor McCririe called the regular meeting of the Genoa Charter Township Board to order at 6:30 p.m. The Pledge of Allegiance was then said. The following members were present constituting a quorum for business: Gary McCririe, Paulette Skolarus, Robin Hunt, Jean Ledford, Linda Rowell, Jim Mortensen and Todd Smith. Also present were: Township Manager Michael Archinal; Township Assistant Manager Kelly VanMarter; Township Attorney Frank Mancuso; and approximately 40 persons in the audience.

A Call to the Public was made with the following response: Kurt Skarjune (president of the Lake Edgewood Condominium Association) addressed the board concerning recent crimes within the township. Petitions were provided asking the township to research the possibility of establishing a fixed law enforcement presence in the township.

Terry Croft – The office was closed today because of the storm and loss of power. The board should look into a generator for the future for a safe haven or shelter in case of disaster.

Approval of Consent Agenda:

Moved by Ledford and supported by Mortensen to approve all items listed under the consent as requested. The motion carried unanimously.

- 1. Payment of Bills.
- 2. Request to Approve Minutes: July 20, 2015
- 3. Request for approval of annual rate adjustments for Lake Edgewood Water and Pine Creek Sewer and Water customers as recommended by Greg Tatara, Utility Director.
- 4. Consider approval of a contract services proposal from the Livingston County Economic Development Council.

Approval of Regular Agenda:

Moved by Hunt and supported by Rowell to approve for action all items listed under the regular agenda. The motion carried unanimously.

5. Clarification of previous action related to the Livingston Christian School special use application at Brighton Church of Nazarene.

A call to the public was made with the following response: Pastor Ben Walls addressed the board and read a statement on behalf of the Church of the Nazarene concerning unintentional mistakes that were made with regard to their request for a school within their facility. Julie Singer – Please follow federal, state and local laws and allow us to extend our church's mission by approving this school as your ordinance requires.

Moved by Rowell and supported by Smith to deny the Special Land Use request by the Church of the Nazarene as provided by Section 19.02.04 (f) (5) for use by the Livingston Christian School. This action is based upon the finding that the proposed use is inconsistent with the standards of Section 19.03.01, 19.03.02, 19.03.03, 19.03.04, and 19.03.05 of the Township Zoning Ordinance and specifically finds that:

- 1.) The expanded use of the church to include a K-12 school will exacerbate the existing and historical negative impacts of the church on the adjacent neighborhood. The need for active traffic management and restricted egress from the facility provides that the site cannot accommodate the use properly and it increases the potential for negative off-site traffic impacts.
- 2.) The proposed use is not consistent with the following goals of the Master Plan:
 - a. "Achieve well-planned, safe, balanced, and pleasant residential neighborhoods."
 - b. "Promote harmonious and organized development consistent with adjacent land uses."
- 3.) The project is contrary to the statement of purpose for the Single Family Residential Zoning in regard to items 3.01.02(e.) and (g.) and (i
- 4.) .) as follows:
 - a. 3.01.02(e.) "Discourage any use of land which may overburden public infrastructure and services and the areas natural resources."
 - b. 3.01.02(g.) "Discourage land use which would generate excessive traffic on residential streets."
 - c. 3.01.02(i.) "Prohibit any land use that would substantially interfere with the development, utilization or continuation of single family dwellings in the District."
- 5.) The proposed use significantly alters the existing or intended character of the general vicinity.
- 6.) The need for traffic management personnel and the potential off-site impacts created by forced right-turn only exiting will be detrimental to the natural environment, public health, safety or welfare by reason of excessive production of traffic. The proposed "D" condition on exit from Church grounds during pick-up and drop-off provides a detriment to the existing walking path, other neighborhoods/buildings for turn-around, in addition to an impact on neighborhood travel including traffic from Worden Lake, Pine Creek, and travelers from the west towards Brighton. In addition, current conditions of this area also include the primary hub for the Brighton Area Schools, with Hornung (elementary), Maltby (intermediate), Scranton (7/8th grade) and Brighton High School. While not all students attending Scranton will flow through Brighton Road, Scranton was not taken into consideration. It is reasonable

- to suggest parents with students at both schools drop off at the High School and then proceed to Scranton which starts school at 7:50 a.m.
- 7.) The potential negative impacts to be created by the use will not be sufficiently mitigated by the conditions of the proposal.
- 8.) The Nazarene Church has a history of non-compliance with past site plan and ordinance requirements resulting in a negative impact on surrounding neighborhoods, notably found in Planning Commission minutes from August 28, 2000, May 12, 2003, July 22, 2013 and April 2015 through current. Historical and consistent behavior suggests further non-compliance from petitioners. Specific issues include the following:
 - a. The applicant has not yet fully implemented the project approved by the Township in 2013. Of particular note are the installation of additional landscaping and parking lot islands;
 - b. The applicant has continued to allow a driver's testing operation, despite being informed that it is an illegal nonconforming use of the property; and
 - c. The applicant has demonstrated disregard for existing approvals by making significant changes to their building design contrary to the approved 2013 plans and without necessary permits or approvals to do so.

The motion carried with McCririe asking Ledford to restate her position on the motion. Ledford stated that she was opposed to the school. The motion passed as follows: Ayes – McCririe, Rowell, Smith and Ledford. Nays – Skolarus, Hunt and Mortensen.

6. Consideration of an environmental impact assessment and site plan for a proposed 3,954 square foot Culver's Restaurant, located on a vacant lot south of Grand River Avenue and west of Latson Rd., Howell, Michigan, parcel #4711-05-400-066. The request is petitioned by Metro Design & Build, Inc.

A. Disposition of Environmental Impact Assessment received on 07-24-15 Moved by Smith and supported by Rowell to approve the impact assessment conditioned upon deliveries occurring at off hours and using small trucks. The motion carried unanimously.

B. Disposition of Final PUD Site Plan dated 07-24-15 Moved by Smith and supported by Rowell to approve the site plan as submitted with all conditions of the planning commission having been completed. The motion carried unanimously.

7. Request to approve the order of the Hearing Officer for removal of the dangerous building located 1112 Chemung Drive.

The homeowner was not present for this petition. Archinal advised the board that a building permit was not secured by a licensed contractor before July 4, 2015. Moved by Skolarus and supported by Rowell to allow the owner 60 days to demolish the building or the township will pursue removal of the dangerous building. The motion carried by roll call vote as follows: Ayes – Ledford, Smith, Hunt, Rowell, Mortensen, Skolarus and McCririe. Nays – None.

Member Discussion

- Ledford asked that a letter of support for the concept of the North-South Commuter Rail Service be sent by the township to the Ann Arbor Area Transportation Authority.
- Archinal was approached concerning a Brighton Schools logo on the water tower near the Cracker Barrel. Original requests from 20 years ago were denied at the request of adjacent homeowner. The board took no action.
- Easements have been secured from the Midway Party Store to Wildwood for construction of a bike/walk path with construction commencing this summer.
- Smith reminded the board of the Melon Fest scheduled for August 14, 15 and 16 which will include close to 300 vendors.

The regular meeting of the Genoa Charter Township Board was adjourned at 7:10 p.m.





2015 Paving Improvements

For your consideration this evening is a proposal from Highway Maintenance for a slurry coat treatment on Tri-Lakes roads and a reconstruction/maintenance improvement for the Township Hall Parking Lot.

The Tri-Lakes Road Improvement Debt Service Fund had a remaining balance of \$139,416. Because the debt for this project has been retired, our options are to refund the balance to the properties within the Special Assessment District or to spend down the balance on a road improvement within the district. Because the district is over 20 years old, a refund would not benefit those persons originally assessed. As discussed with the Board previously, we sought out an appropriate road improvement that would benefit the district and extend the life of the pavement.

At your July 20, 2015 meeting, you approved a proposal from Hubbell, Roth & Clark for a Tri-Lakes Slurry Coat and Spot Base Repair with an estimated cost of \$105,000. The bid from Highway Maintenance is for \$109,250; slightly above the estimate but below the remaining debt services balance.

The Township Hall Parking Lot improvement proposal was also approved by the Board on July 20, 2015 with an engineering estimate of \$81,000. The bid from Highway Maintenance is for \$77,850. This project will involve reconstructing the back parking, including the installation of edge drains. The remaining parking areas will be crack sealed. A letter from Hubbell, Roth & Clark is included for your information.

Please consider the following action:

RE: Approach to funding of Grand Oaks Drive improvements

Dear Mr. Archinal,

Cleary University has received letters outlining a plan for improvements to Grand Oaks Drive and a Grand Oak Road Special Assessment Draft Roll. The University understands and is supportive of this project, but only with an equitable distribution of cost. There are 35 parcels listed. It appears there are 25 owners.

The draft roll lists 4 parcels owned by Cleary University but only one has direct access to Grand Oaks Drive, parcel 4711-05-302-011. Assuming a Pro Rata Share must be incorporated in the Special Assessment Draft Roll it seems each property owner, not each parcel, be assessed a single Pro Rata Share. Three Cleary parcels have what is considered frontage on Grand Oaks Drive. The total acreage of those three parcels is 6.28 acres. There are 8 single parcel owners listed with acreage exceeding the 6.28 acres of Cleary University property but it is proposed that Cleary pay \$33,000 Pro Rata Share and each of the property owners with a single parcel are proposed to be assessed \$11,000.

One of the parcels listed as owned by Cleary University has no frontage on Grand Oaks Drive, its main access point is E. Grand River and the majority of all vehicular traffic uses the E. Grand River access point. All non-Cleary University properties have only one point of access, off Grand Oaks Drive and yet the draft roll proposes that a property with no direct frontage on Grand Oaks be assessed via the same method as all those with frontage on Grand Oaks.

Also, the draft roll proposes assessing total acreage, including the 29.6 acres of 4711-05-302-11 but the primary access to that parcel is E. Grand River. The University estimates that no more than 10% of total vehicle access to this parcel is via Grand Oaks Drive and that fact should be taken in to consideration with regard to this assessment.

The current approach to assessment places 13.5% of the property owner cost on Cleary University, one of 25 property owners. Considering just the property with frontage on Grand Oaks Drive, the total acreage of those three parcels is less than 3%, but the Special Assessment Draft Roll proposed Cleary University, for the three parcels on Grand Oaks, pay approximately 6% of the total property owner total contribution to the project.

Thank you for your letter of July 17, 2015 and our conversation of July 30. Distributing costs through special assessments is never easy nor is it well defined by statute. Public Act 188 of 1954 requires that assessments "... shall be the relative portion of the whole sum to be levied against all parcels of land in the special assessment district as the benefit to the parcel of land bears to the total benefit to all parcels of land in the special assessment district." In determining the formula I endeavored to spread the costs in as fair a manner as possible. The smallest parcel at .96 acres pays \$12,326. Clear University with a total of 35.89 acres pays \$93,550.

An informational meeting was held earlier this summer and attendees were generally in favor of the project scope and the method for spreading costs. Petitions were distributed with the draft roll attached. To date, we have received 15 signed petitions. Because these petitions were signed based on the numbers provided, I am unable to modify the roll.

With a millage rate of .8142, the entire district generates only \$10,200 per year in Genoa Township taxes. The Genoa Township General Fund is contributing \$200,000 to this project. This significant commitment was not without its controversy and is an acknowledgement of Grand Oaks' deplorable condition and the fact that, with the new interchange, traffic will continue to increase. The Livingston County Road Commission is also contributing over \$100,000 to this project even though the improvement does not touch their property. While the burden on the properties within the district is significant, the level of public support is unprecedented. Even with some disagreement over the method of calculation the project is a bargain representing, in my opinion, a substantial benefit to Cleary University. With the interchange (to which the Township contributed \$1,500,000), Cleary University's long-term plans and a reconstructed pavement it is likely that your Grand Oaks entrance will see an increase in usage. I would like to have your support for this project.

I've communicated with you before, but my name is Kathy Moorehouse, and I'm the Director of Light of the World Academy, the charter school that is being impacted by the denial of Livingston Christian Schools' special use permit.

First, I want to thank you for the support you've given Livingston Christian Schools, and by extension, Light of the World Academy. Please know that your support is appreciated by every single one of our parents and students - many of whom live in Genoa Township. They will not forget this.

I know that you've been receiving e-mails urging the board to hold a special meeting to consider the federal lawsuit, and I'd like to join in urging you to schedule a special meeting. I know that any two members can schedule a special meeting, so I'm hoping you'll do that.

My reasons are:

- I. We're losing precious time as the start of school approaches. Livingston Christian needs to move into its new building so they we can move into their old building. Every day that passes is a day we lose toward getting our buildings ready for the fall. As it is, it's going to be an around-the-clock effort by our teachers and staff, so the sooner this is decided, the better it will be for both schools.
- 2. If you don't schedule a special meeting, I'm assuming the lawsuit will be discussed in closed session during next Monday's special meeting anyway. In the minds of the board members who have been opposing Livingston Christian, nothing will change in their minds between now and Monday. It would benefit everyone to have this decided now instead of having to wait until next Monday. You can decide tomorrow that you want to schedule a special meeting for Wednesday.
- 3. I don't know what advice your attorney will give you, but from everything we've heard, it will be extremely difficult and costly for Genoa Township if you decide to fight this in court. I hope your decision will be to instruct your attorney to settle this in a way that benefits both the township and the schools, and that will allow everyone to move past this.
- 4. If we have to, we'll wait 10 days to two weeks for the judge to issue an injunction on this, but that will just prolong the circus that this has become. We don't want that, Livingston Christian doesn't want that, and I know the Genoa Township board doesn't want that.

Please know that nobody wanted this circus. We're just a little old school that wants to get on with things and get our students into class! Whatever you can do to help our situation, we would be so grateful.

I know that you're the board members who have been our supporters. We appreciate that so much.

Genoa Township Trustees and Manager:

We applaud your effort to hold all institutions to the same standards to which you routinely hold private businesses in Genoa Township. Doing business in our community means following zoning, building, and any other statutory requirements to which the general public is held accountable.

I attended a Township meeting in which a change of use was being requested for part of the Naz. I attended, as I was concerned about the potential of overflow traffic affecting the residential quality of my neighborhood on State Street. We remember, well, when the high school suspended bussing and a near constant stream of traffic cut around the Main Street back-ups by using the neighboring streets that run parallel to Main.

More recently, residents of Pine Creek expressed frustration with traffic that circumvents Main Street by cutting through their neighborhood. Adding 1, 2, or possibly 3 new schools in the area immediately surrounding the high school is certain to add to their chorus of complaints. (Remember that Lindbom Classical Academy is planning a school, as is Northridge Church.) Allowing one institution to flout the rules may result in Township liabilities as more schools expect the same exceptions to be made for them. Again, we applied your integrity.

All decisions regarding zoning and building should be made with an insistence on fairness and with deference to the legitimate concerns of the homeowners in and commuters through the area.

It is incumbent upon elected representatives to protect both the safety and livability of the residential neighborhoods under its leadership. I watched a distracted driver strike a child riding his bike on State Street in 2004. The boy was okay. But this memory is as clear to me as if it happened yesterday. Our narrow streets, without sidewalks or lighting, are particularly ill suited for handling the over-flow traffic that is routinely pushed onto them on busy football nights, weekday mornings, and the occasional train back up. Adding hundreds of cars to Main Street during the exact times that the thoroughfare is already busy would be reckless and could hold the Township responsible for the subsequent traffic nuisance created in the residential neighborhoods that were never designed for high traffic volumes.

Please stand firm in your well reasoned and painstakingly considered decision. Those of us that have followed this debate know that you took your time and deliberated in good faith. We are pleased and proud that our elected officials have integrity and are able to abide by their oaths in the most difficult of times.

My name is Bill Italia, I am a resident of Genoa Township for the past 17 years, and I am reaching out today to express my concerns regarding the recent vote to deny Livingston Christian's move into Brighton. I am sure by now, numerous people have reached out to you regarding a vote that based on the facts that I have been privy to, seems short sighted.

Not only have you impacted the families of Livingston Christian, you have impacted my family directly on multiple fronts. My personal involvement with the school is through volunteer work developing the technical infrastructure within the school. There is however, a much broader reach to the hurt that this vote has created. You see, my wife is the Kindergarten teacher at Light of the World Academy (LOTWA). I am extremely proud to state that fact. To watch her with these children is something I stand in awe of. She and all of the other teachers have the ability to influence the next generation in the most profound way possible and truly relish that opportunity. These children and their parents/grandparents that support them are their extended family, and your vote has threatened to take that away from them. 

Dear Mr. Snyder,

A new Michigan charter school, Light of the World Academy in Pinckney, is in danger of being forced to close by the Genoa Township Board. They are scheduled to open this fall in a building that once housed Livingston Christian Schools. However, Livingston Christian Schools, a nonprofit organization, is being denied the ability to lease building space from the Brighton Nazarene Church in Brighton. Because of this denial, Livingston Christian Schools will have to remain at their Pinckney location, leaving Light of the World Academy without a building.

The Genoa Township Board has not been forthcoming with the actual reason for the denial. The only reason that has been stated is a traffic concern. Two independent traffic studies were performed and both stated there would be no noticeable traffic impact from the school moving into the church. The Genoa Township planning commission agreed with the traffic studies and approved the permit. The Genoa Township Board rejected the approval by its own planning commission. Genoa Township Supervisor Gary McCririe even acknowledged the traffic engineers' findings. However, Mr. McCririe stated he still, "wasn't satisfied."

There has been no legal reason given for this permit to be denied. I was under the impression that a township board is required to vote based on the ordinances of the township. It appears this denial was based on emotion and personal opinion, not on facts.

As I stated above, this denial is causing a brand new charter school to close. Light of the World Academy is the only Montessori charter school within SO square miles of their location. Montessori has traditionally been the type of education that's only been available to families of financial means. The families planning to attend Light of the World Academy are beyond thrilled that they're going to be able to send their children to the school of their choice now. The closure of this school will result in 160 students without a school of their choice, and cause the 30 staff members to lose their jobs.

I appreciate the opportunity to present this situation to you and your staff, and I thank you for your urgency in reviewing this information. Both schools desire to open as scheduled on September 8th.

Dear Genoa Township Board Members,

I am writing today to request that the Genoa Township Board reconsider the previous votes cast for the special use permit for Brighton Nazarene Church (BNC) to house Livingston Christian Schools (LCS) starting this upcoming school year. I am requesting that the Genoa Township Board call a special meeting to reverse their previous decision to reject the special use permit. This is based on a number of factors which may or may not be new information to the Township Board.

In various public forums I have heard and read that concerns with traffic flow is one of the main concerns of the board. In order to reduce the impact of increased traffic and the concerns of the Township Planning Commission and Board a number of actions have either been agreed to or have already been implemented:

- (1) LCS has agreed to a staggered start and stop time for school with the Planning Commission in order to reduce the impact of any additional traffic in the area, especially considering other schools already located in the immediate vicinity. The agreement with the Planning Commission is that no change to LCS start/stop times would be made with prior approval.
- (2) A traffic study was completed and the report has already been shared with the Planning Commission indicating acceptable impact to the adjacent community.
- (3) The motion approved by the Planning Commission restricts the number of employees and students that can be housed at BNC.
- (4) The motion approved by the Planning Commission expires after the 2016-2017 school year and requires a yearly report of traffic control plans allowing for both the Township Board and Planning Commission to re-evaluate its decision based on actual data as opposed to unconfirmed concerns within a reasonable time period limiting impact to the township.

In writing this letter, I acknowledge that there were other concerns with regard to property separation of the church with adjacent neighbors (fencing, landscaping, etc..) and also the site plan and changes thereof. I know this has been a contentious point with all parties. In spite of all of the difficulties, according to the motion approved by the Planning Commission and verbally supported by various neighbors themselves, it is confirmed that BNC is complying with the requirements set forth by the Planning Commission and has adequately address the concerns of the HOA of AlJoann. The Planning Commission has approved both the site plan and environmental impact assessment. It should be noted that many of these items are being addressed by BNC at great financial cost. This is being done in order to comply with direction of the Planning Commission, in an effort to repair damaged relationships with the neighboring community and show good faith in addressing past issues with compliance to Township matters.

The decision to reject the Special Use Permit also has a domino impact on Light of the World Academy (LOTWA) in Hamburg Township. LOTWA was to move into the current LCS location in Pinckney as part of its Charter School Approval. If LCS is not allowed to move to BNC, then LOTWA faces potential closure impacting a very high number of families of students, as well as teachers that could lose their jobs. Although LOTWA is not a Genoa Township issue, it is still a repercussion of the decision of the Genoa Township Board. This decision impacts many of the families that reside in Genoa Township. There are numerous families that call Genoa Township home that attend both LCS and LOTWA. There are an even larger number of families that support the Genoa Township community with their hard earned money.

Lastly, I believe that not enough has been highlighted with respect to the good that the school can bring to the community. The students and staff at LCS are exceptional. They are intelligent, hard working, compassionate, well rounded, and of the highest integrity. The students and staff will be a tremendously positive addition to the Genoa Township community. The proven good that LCS can bring to the community must be considered along with the concerns already documented. The Genoa Township Board and community should be proud to welcome LCS to BNC and should be working to find a solution to this request instead of rejecting it and moving on to other matters.

I have two children that attend LCS and my wife is employed by LCS, so this matter is personal to me and has led me to write this letter. I want to ensure that all of you know that I understand that your job is very difficult and requires difficult decisions made that will not be popular with all parties. I respect the challenging position that the Planning Commission and Township Board faces on this issue as well as many others. I have lived in Livingston County my entire live, primarily in Howell and now in Green Oak Township, so I know that the growth of the general area, and specifically Genoa Township, has been astounding and is difficult to manage and plan.

Based on the aforementioned, I reiterate my opening request for the Genoa Township Board to convene a special meeting to reconsider and reverse its previous rejection of the Special Use Permit by BNC to house LCS beginning in September of 2015.

Dear Board,

My name is Mary Ann Fithian and I am the parent of two children who attend Light of the World Academy. Undoubtedly by now you have heard about our little school and the big impact its teachers and community has on the families who attend LOTWA. My story, is a little different. In my house the reality is education is something we don't have much time to think about. In my house we are much more worried about keeping my daughter healthy than keeping up with what she is learning in school. In my house I am more concerned with keeping germs and viruses clear from my home, than making sure my children have perfect attendance. And to all of you this maybe a building issue or a logistical issue but for me, this is about my daughters happiness and her being able to live as normal of a life as she can.

Faith was five the day she was invited to LOTWA. The Pastor of Shalom Lutheran Church (not even my church at the time) came to see her while she was in very grave health at Mott Children's Hospital in Ann Arbor. She was septic and in the worst shape we had ever seen her in. Pastor Kurt asked her what he could do for her and she said, I just want to have a best friend.

Faith had spent most of the last year in the hospital and she was never able to attend Kindergarten. He invited her at that time to join the families at LOTWA and assured me, she would feel welcome and safe in that environment. I remember thinking to myself....school is so very far from ever happening for my baby.

But it did. She attended that year for five days....not whole days but five days. That's where she met Havannah, who quickly became the best friend she had asked Pastor Kurt to help her find. It was pretty magical, I was a huge skeptic but quickly began to see the magic of this little school.

The following year, Faith's 1st grade year, was not a good one for her. She had 16 admissions into the hospital and I began to wonder if things would ever turn around for her. During that year her brother, Will began to feel the stress of having his sister be in and out of the hospital and having to have his family separated while she was admitted. At that point we decided Will needed the extra hands on approach he would receive from the teachers at LOTWA and we made the move. Just as it happened with Faith, he quickly felt at home and safe in the environment and his learning flourished. Second Grade was great for Faith. She had her healthiest year yet, and she attended two-thirds of the school year, and she learned to READ!!!! The beauty of a Montessori school for a child like Faith with a life-threatening illness is she can be there when she's healthy and she doesn't need to catch up. She works at her pace and she never feels the pressure of having to rush to get to the level of the other students. Which with all of the stress she has in her life, its such a blessing that her education is so organic. This past year was third grade for Faith. She missed the 1st day of school and she missed the last day of school. She missed every holiday party and every birthday party she was invited to. She missed the school play and the Christmas program. She's had a

very bad year. She's become dependant on IV's and has a PICC line placed. Through every bit of this years heartache, all she wants is to get back to school.

In our home we look at attending school as a privilege. Faith has been in the operating room at Mott twenty-seven times and once at Boston Children's. She hasn't what had what I would consider a fair shot at life. But she has been incredibly blessed. And when I stop and think of the blessings in her life most, if not all have come by way of the Light of the World Academy and the families that attend the school with us.

They are here for her. They send Valentines home when she can't be at the school. They bring projects that she misses and special holiday art. They send birthday treats home for her, they do everything they can to keep her spirits up and they pray, they pray to keep her here with us and healthy.

And they are here for me. In ways you can not possibly imagine, they bring meals, and they help clean, they replace broken things, and they show up with a car when mine quit running.....I can't even begin to tell you, because unless you've lived a life taking care of your child who needs medical attention every two-three hours you can't possibly understand how helpless you feel, then you have this community of people who surround you with love.

They love and they care. They want Faith to have the same experiences that their children have. They want Will to be able to just be a big brother. They want me, just to me a mom. My life has been filled with heartache watching my child deal with more health issues than any one person should have to endure in a lifetime, but the thought of her losing her school, her happy place, makes me literally lose my words.

Dear Polly,

I am a teacher at Livingston Christian School and have been on staff there for the past 9 years. I wanted to sincerely thank you for recently voting yes to approve a special permit for Brighton Church of the Nazarene (BCN) to house Livingston Christian School (LCS)! We greatly appreciated your support of this permit. I would like to respectfully request that you consider revisiting this topic with your fellow township board members, who voted no, and ask them to please consider changing their no votes to yes votes.

When I first came to LCS, our student enrollment was approximately 220 students. Over the next few years we continued to see a decline in our enrollment. There were various reasons for this; mainly a steep downward decline in the economy, Christian families deciding to home school, and our Pinckney location. Even though we love our building and community, our school is approximately a 15 minute drive from any freeway access. This makes it difficult for working parents to drive their children to and from school. In addition, the Pinckney area has not shown much growth over the past decade. Even though our building, the former St. Mary's School building, is lovely, we have outgrown it, and it has needed many costly repairs due to the fact it was built in the 1950's. When our board met with the BNC and they were willing to allow us to lease their new building, we thought that would be a perfect arrangement and provide us with a more central location with easy freeway access. The BNC was already building their addition.

When I read the articles on WHMI's website, as well as the Livingston Daily Press, it said that the request was voted down due to concerns about noise, traffic, and the presumption on the part of the church and school that it would be approved. The township had a traffic engineer whose study concluded that because we would stagger our start and end times, there would not really be any additional problem with traffic. As far as noise goes, Brighton High School is across the street. Between the intense lights on the football field, noise from the high school band, athletic events, and high school drivers, our small school will not be an issue. My husband and I have had our 4 children, who are now adults, attend BHS, play various sports, and graduate from the Brighton Area Schools. I have been on the high school grounds dozens of times over the years. Compared to the noise, traffic, etc. from their 2,000 students and families, we were astonished to learn of the concern over noise and traffic that our small school would contribute to the road and neighboring homes. Our family lives 2 1/2 miles from the high school. There are many times we are able to hear the noise from the band. I understand the neighbors were concerned, but I would like to respectfully point out that the church was already there before their subdivision was even built. It seems to me that the neighbors of the BCN are upset with them and our school received a no vote because of that.

In addition, our school was an innocent bystander. Because it was the church that was seeking the approval, and we would be leasing the building, BCN requested that we not speak at any of the meetings. Please be assured that we at LCS and BCN respect your authority. We had no deliberate intention of ever trying to sidestep the Genoa Twp. Boards when we began stating on our website that we were moving to Brighton. It was truly an innocent mistake on our part. In hindsight, our school board should have done a more proactive job investigating what was required of the church in order to file the appropriate permits at the proper time, allowing LCS to lease the building. Please be assured that there was never any deliberate or intentional act on either part to undermine your authority by posting/advertising that we were moving (prior to it being officially granted). We sincerely apologize for our errors.

As a result of the no vote, our only recourse is to return to our building in Pinckney. If we do that, Light of the World School will have no building. They were going to buy our building and start school there in September. Not just one school, but two have been impacted by the no vote by the Twp. Board.

Our hearts are in the right place. We love God, want to serve Him, and help our precious children grow in His wisdom and grace. We are a ministry to God, the community, and to our students and their families. Would you please consider taking another look at this topic and discussing with your fellow board members the urgency of considering changing their votes to yes? With school starting one month from now, time is of the essence. We urge you to reconsider allowing the permit for the BCN.

Please let me introduce myself. My name is Susan Lang, and I have two children that attend Light of the World Academy. My daughter will be a second grader, and my son a fifth grader.

I have a unique situation to share with you, because my experience with Lotwa is a bit different. This is because my 10 year old son, has autism.

We have been down quite a path as you can well imagine. But I will tell you that a true light in our world, and more importantly his, has been this school. My son has been a student here since kindergarten. When he started here 5 years ago my son did not speak. He had a handful of words at best. He could not read, he had no math skills. He had very little social skills. Or coping skills in general. What he did have was a light in his eye that few people could catch, or even begin to notice or understand. Light of the World saw this light, and he became a student here.

Because of this school and the teachers here, my son can read. He can do math. He has amazing social skills. He has many many friends. He participates in class. He does reports on his own on states, clouds, tee pees, Pearl Harbor, the list goes on. He has been given opportunities here that surpass what he could get anywhere else. Through school he takes piano lessons. He participates in the school plays. He even sang a solo as Joseph in the Christmas play this past year. Lotwa had faith that he could do these things. It takes this type of faith, given to a child with special needs, from a Montessori school like Lotwa to help him thrive. This is just one story of many many other children given these same opportunities from this amazing school.

If you've ever known any child with autism, you know the gravity that what others may consider a simple change can have. We as parents, in a combined effort with the educators have spent years establishing an environment in which he thrives like none other. I cannot imagine the impact on him if this were all taken away, due to some traffic misunderstandings for Livingston Christian.

In summary, because of Lotwa and the opportunities he has been given here, we have seen our son flourish academically, socially, and emotionally in ways we never imagined possible. Dear Genoa Township Board Members:

As administrator of Livingston Christian Schools for the past fourteen years I'm familiar with every aspect of the school's daily functions. I attended each of the four meetings in which Brighton Nazarene Church presented its case for the special use permit that would have allowed LCs to rent the space from the church. In addition I also attended the two township board meetings. I heard what the church stated as well as the concerns voiced by the township, and felt the deep-seated distrust of the church may have been the primary cause for the board's rejection. I do not know the history of the church and its interactions with neighbors nor how it has fulfilled its commitments to the township, but that seems to me to be at the heart of the board's reluctance to approve the special use permit. It is beyond my purview to try to correct past grievances relating to the church. However, I'd like to address a couple of issues that I felt were not fully explained in the hearings.

The additional traffic that will be generated by the school at pick-up time is genuinely one that needs to be better understood. I recognize you must look at statistics and probabilities to legally formulate a projection for traffic, and I felt that was well done, but understanding the historical picture of school attendance and driving habits may be a more accurate measurement. From the fourteen years of working at LCS we know that close to 100 percent of our students will arrive in vehicles rather than by walking or riding bikes. We also know that between 60-65% will arrive in a car-pooled format and those that do not car-pool are mostly early childhood and those from less populated geographic areas. In addition, more than 65% of our families have multiple children enrolled at the school. Our juniors and seniors represent approximately fifteen drivers of which almost all remain after school to participate in sports programs. Lastly, our early childhood program is composed of part time and full time families. The part time families pick up their children at approximately 11:15 a.m. Combining the above mentioned inputs the actual number of vehicles that will leave at the normal pick-up time approximates 75-85 if we have 160 students enrolled.

Much was made of the school's aggressive approach to advertising its move to Brighton. In reality, LCS held two open houses for new families prior to being alerted that a special use permit was required before occupancy would be granted. We immediately stopped radio and print advertising and have not done any since then. We did retain our website statement that we were going to Brighton Naz. Viewing it from your perspective I understand how it was an indication of presumption. It was not meant to be, but rather was intended to inform perspective families that we were intending to move to the Brighton area, which has been a long-term goal. In retrospect we ought to have deleted the specific location. I apologize for that oversight.

By this time you are aware of the vast number of people affected by your decision. I, and the families involved in the two schools, ask simply that you reverse your cumulative vote and approve the special use permit which will allow LCS to move to Brighton and Light of the World Academy to move into the Pinckney building, thus salvaging jobs and allowing two schools to continue to flourish.

There is a concern that the Genoa Township Board may not have had all of the facts available to them when they turned down the Special Use Permit, specifically the recent traffic studies. It was my understanding that the traffic engineers who evaluated the potential traffic impact for the Planning Commission all agreed that the additional traffic would not be a concern. My name is Glenda Brown. My husband and I are one of the founding families that started, what is now called, Livingston Christian School (LCS), 30 years ago. Today, we have 3 grandchildren attending LCS, and their mother/our daughter, teaches there as well.

I have been watching the process of LCS's move to Brighton Nazarene over the past several months, and I too, am profoundly disappointed that the Genoa Township Board voted to deny the Special Use Permit for Brighton Church of the Nazarene to lease space to Livingston Christian School.

Connecting the dots....

This is what we know:

- 1) Traffic studies were conducted by Safety Engineers.
- 2) Safety Engineers concluded that traffic would NOT be a problem.

Please understand and be aware that your decision will directly effect the lives of nearly 400 people.

The potential move of Livingston Christian Schools to the Nazarene Church in Brighton does not just involve those students and staff. Additionally, it also involves nearly 150 students and 30 to 40 staff of the Light of the World Academy that was planning to move into the old LCS building in Pinckney. If LCS does not move to the Naz they may be back at their school building in Pinckney. If LCS is at the old school building LOTWA has **NO** place to go (they are required to locate in Pinckney) and will have to close therefore 30 - 40 people will be unemployed and around 150 kids will go to a school that may not fit (in some cases) their individual learning needs.

This is such a difficult letter to write, so many lives will be impacted because of your response to it and others like it.

Please be patient with us.

Time is short and the stakes are high.

Our children are our future, every child in every community will, in some way, impact each one of us.

We understand that you have a very hard job to do and we appreciate your time and effort in service to the community.

I am sure that sometimes it is hard to get all of the information together that is needed for a correct and wise decision. Perhaps there are times that a decision is made and then new

information, or a new understanding of information comes to light. Those are the times that

develop our character to a new and hopefully higher level. This may (or may not) be one of those times.

Our hearts have been heavy since we read on the WHMI website of your meeting of Aug. 3 and the impact

regarding Livingston Christian School and also the Light of The World Academy.

We have a son attending LCS and have followed the results of all the meetings regarding the Brighton Nazarene Church

and LCS. Obviously we have been concerned about the 2015 – 16 school year and where it will be held for LCS.

We are thankful that there is anther option available for LCS for the coming year (if needed).

The problem with that option and what concerns us most right now is the situation it causes for LOTWA.

They have **no** other options. The worry and stress this is creating for the children, families and staff is more than most

can imagine. Because Light of the World is a Montessori school it offers different ways of learning that can make all the difference between academic success and failure for some of its students. It is heartbreaking to watch the child you love so dearly struggle and fight to learn by standard methods only to fail time and time again. Then you find a new school that offers a different way for that child to learn. They offer a different structure and form of learning for children who do not do well in the 'one size fits all' that most public schools must offer. A way that is unique and individual to that child and the child thrives! Because of the larger class sizes public schools often cannot or do not provide the individualized methods that are most successful for these students. That is why schools like LOTWA and LCS are so important because they offer traditional and unique learning opportunities. Even more important now is the fact that LOTWA will be a charter school and therefore accessible to a whole new group of kids that need that environment but could not previously afford it.

We appreciate that you have concerns about traffic on Brighton road at the Naz. We certainly want everyone to be safe, as do you.

But we can't help but wonder if you have actually gotten all of the information you needed to help make that part of your decision.

For example;

LCS enrollment is around 160 but that does not mean 160 cars each morning and afternoon. While many of the kids are from Genoa township, many have a longer commute and near or far we have lots of carpools. We carpool our 1 son with 2 other kids (and may pick up an extra one this year). Thus 3 kids = 1 car; not 3 kids = 3 cars. Some carpools have 4 to 8 kids. Add to that the fact that in many cases 2 or 3 children are enrolled from the same family and you cut down traffic considerably.

I know that LCS has also tried to re-arrange the school start and end times to help avoid traffic problems with Brighton High across the road.

We have a very small school so as far as sports teams go there would be very minimal traffic for practices and sadly also for games.

There have not been any other regularly scheduled after school activities associated with LCS.

It also seems likely that with the Latson road interchange open there would be some reduction in traffic heading to the freeway in that area compared to a couple of years ago.

We strongly encourage you to re-visit this issue by calling a special meeting for as soon as possible, remembering that it impacts approximately 80 jobs (shoppers and taxpayers) and 300 children in your community.

Surely there must be some way to get even a 1 year very conditional approval for this. Again, we are not asking this just for LCS,

we have a fall back building. We are asking also for Light of the World and their children and families. As we understand it they

have no other place but the LCS building in Pinckney.

As a very concerned parent, I am writing to ask for your support and consideration to accept this appeal to <u>allow Livingston Christian</u> to move their facilities to <u>Brighton Nazarene</u>.

This matter is extremely urgent as we are less than 1 month from the start of the school year and we find that we may need to find a new school for our children. This is not simply a 'change in school' situation, it could lead to a change in educational approach as well. Without this location approval, hundreds of children are negatively impacted. I am struggling to see where another population is disadvantaged if the move is approved. I would appreciate a return email to help me understand the key concerns and issues. My child's education and well being is directly impacted by this decision, as are many other families and children.

- From my understanding, the key factor raised related to traffic on Brighton Road. This is easily remedied by the staggered
 drop off and pick up patterns the school plans to use. As a private school without use of public busses I'm sure the school can
 very effectively modify their class times to meet whatever demands/concerns the city planners may have. Through
 communications from the school, I understand that the traffic engineers agree that this is not a prime concern.
- A move of LCS to Brighton Nazarene would also draw economic growth to the Brighton community through shopping and dining conveniences.

My children have attended both LCS and Light of the World Academy (LOTWA) in their education and I credit each for providing them with the foundation they needed to succeed. My son migrated into the public schools in 4th grade and is doing well, but I opted to keep my daughter in the private setting for several reasons.

So, I am most directly impacted by this decision because my daughter is ready to enter 9th grade at LCS. She is very bright and excels in most subjects, but has clear needs and accommodational requirements for test taking, science and math. I have felt very fortunate for the private options available to us in Livingston County with both LOTWA and LCS to meet the needs of my daughter. I passionately feel that the public schools could not have supported her in the same manner, and believe she would not have been anywhere near as successful. And, her self esteem and self confidence are very high, regardless of her personal challenges – i credit this to the safe, small class sizes and limited number of teachers/continuity of teaching styles.

My daughter has a motor planning disorder and a learning disability in math, . Both LOTWA and LCS are perfect environments to support her challenges without making her feel 'different'. She represents a small population of kids who are not visibly 'disabled' but are also not wired to succeed in the traditional educational setting. The small class size minimizes her distractions (important for the motor planning disorder) and affords teachers the ability to pace the class based on their various needs. They also can provide her the one-one support she needs in some classes and modified curriculum (in math) to help her progress at her own pace in math without the stigma of 'special ed'.

My experience with both schools are that they often fit a special niche for some families that is important to sustain. Some families are drawn to the religious freedom that the schools allow. Others, like me, feel that the smaller class sizes and limited distractions are a critical component to the well being and enriching learning environment that they need. After 10 years in the small-school, private setting, I am exceptionally concerned with the potential to disrupt my daughters educational progress.

The Brighton Nazarene location and arrangement were a great option for LCS. The building and location provides a significant upgrade in facilities for our students at a very low cost. It also solved a problem for the LOTWA families who need a larger facility to support the growth and success of that program.

Please re-consider your ruling in this matter.

First, let me thank you for the position that you hold and the significant amount of time and consideration that you put into all of the decisions that you make toward the greater Livingston County community. You are called to make difficult and often unpopular decisions regarding what is best for the city of Brighton.

It is my intent to respectfully ask you to reconsider your most recent decision to deny Brighton Nazarene Church a special-use permit that would allow Livingston Christian School to occupy and operate under this location. I attended several meetings where the "traffic issues" were discussed. This point seems hardly negligible due to the fact that drop-off/pick-up times would be staggered with other local schools. In addition, the minimal amount of cars (approx. 100) added to traffic seems insignificant. The city engineer cited this as a non-issue.

In addition, I would think that you would encourage and welcome a new school into your community. The added foot traffic and potential consumerism would be a benefit for local businesses. My name is Todd Lang, and I'd like to implore you to reconsider your decision on the Livingston Christian School occupying the new location on Brighton road. It is apparent that you may not have all of the facts on not only the 'traffic' situation, but the implications this decision will have on a multitude of families who live and work in Genoa Township. As a parent, this decision has devastated our family and our children who now have no school. I'm asking you to reconsider.

First, I don't understand the traffic concerns. Have you considered all of the facts? In reality, there will be maybe 100 cars staggered over the course of the day. The impact on traffic will be miniscule compared to, as an example, the impact that closing main street in Brighton every weekend for festivals, or the typical 5:00 traffic in Genoa Township, or the line in the morning caused by people buying their coffees at Biggie B...

Next, and most important – your decision has impacted several hundred children from TWO schools who no longer have a school for the fall which starts in 3 weeks. My children go to LOTWA who will not be able to open now given your decision. This has a devastating consequence on our family and our children specifically.

Let me explain personally how this impacts my family:

Two of my children go to this school, one of whom has autism. The public school system left him behind, but because of his current school he is becoming mainstreamed. For 5 tumultuous years his current school has finally contributed to us having our son back. There are many children like him that your decision has impacted. For our son in particular –we have NO SCHOOL for him to go to now.

If you've ever known any child with autism, you know the gravity that what others may consider a simple change can have. We, as parents and educators in a combined effort, have spent years establishing an environment in which our son thrives like none other. Again, your decision based on inaccurate data on 'traffic' concerns has had an impact greater than you realize. Our children are without a school now. Our son will regress. And that is simply unacceptable.

I have taught at Livingston Christian Schools for some 15 years, and I absolutely have a passion for what I do and the positive impact I am able to have on children. I humbly ask you reconsider your rejection of the special use permit allowing us to relocate our school to the Brighton Nazarene Church. I have not been privy to much of the decision making, planning, or actions regarding building and permitting, but I do know that your board's decision will ultimately affect many families and students I cherish. Additionally, you are now probably aware how this also affects another school in Pinckney, Light of the World Academy, who were counting on moving into our vacated building.

I have attended several of the township meetings and recognize the amount of time and energy you must invest in making decisions affecting thousands of people in your area. You have many perspectives to consider and that certainly must be challenging, especially in our current situation. Clearly, we need considerate, thoughtful, and proactive people to serve our communities, and I do thank you for that role you fill in our local area.

Additionally, I have also coordinated the safety patrol and traffic flow procedures at LCS for a number of years now. The traffic flow issues appear to be your main concern, but what I do not understand is that two traffic experts have approved a plan and agree that it will not cause back-ups or challenge exiting or entering Brighton Road. At the beginning of each school year, we inform new families in a meeting of the traffic flow pattern so that the first day of school is as seamless as possible. Drivers quickly grow accustomed to the traffic pattern, making the traffic flow a non-issue. In fact, many families at our school car pool or students come early and stay late as a result of extra-curricular activities such as sports, reducing the number of cars coming and going at the same time. As educators, we are problem solvers and even before the experts were required, LCS had already thought through making this a smooth traffic pattern in light of the parking lot and the Brighton Road traffic.

Finally, I have no way of understanding what was done correctly or incorrectly in the planning of Brighton Nazarene Church facilities to house a day school, but I do know many faculty and children will be affected by the refusal of the special use permit. I would like to thank you for all your time in the matter of the special use permit at Brighton Nazarene Church to allow Livingston Christian School to lease the new addition. I can only imagine what that must be like to consider all of the ramifications of issuing the permit. I am asking you to reconsider your decision to not allow the school to lease it by calling a special meeting to resolve this matter. I believe one of the top reasons cited was the traffic problems that are thought to become an issue. Livingston Christian parents do not all arrive at once to bring or get their children. We will use a staggered drop off and pick up that will not cause a problem on Brighton Road. We have many families that carpool. I drive by the Naz at 7:40 a.m. each week day during the school year and there are only about 3 or 4 cars on the road at that time, often fewer. Brighton High School classes start around 7:20, so all of those students are already in class at the time LCS would be dropping off students. They also get out of school before LCS students would so pick up time would not be a problem either. The traffic engineers who studied this for the Planning Commission all agreed that the traffic wouldn't be a concern.

I live in Brighton and have 3 children, two who have already graduated from LCS and the last one is a Senior this year. My children have only ever attended LCS. They have all loved their time there. It has such a family atmosphere and not only do the teachers and staff know them by name, they also know much about each student. The teachers and staff are dedicated to the school, even though they could earn more money elsewhere. They are committed to giving their best and let the students know how important they are by giving of their time, even coming to their sporting events. They also spend their own money to buy items that will enhance their teaching.

I work at LCS and have done so for the past 8 years. I am the sub coordinator and substitute teach there. I don't know if you are aware that LCS uses some Brighton Shared Time teachers and in turn, BAS gets to count our students as part of their student body. Due to that, BAS gets Federal money for each of the students at LCS. If LCS were located in Brighton, our enrollment would increase, drawing students from other school districts and in turn, resulting in more Federal money for the Brighton public school system.

With all of the uncertainty about the location of LCS for the 2015-2016 school year, we are starting to lose students. This decision not only effects LCS, but Light of the World Academy. They were planning to lease the LCS building in Pinckney and if LCS isn't able to move, LOTWA will be unable to move as well. They will not be able to open their charter school and it will displace many students as well as teachers. I urge you to please reconsider the special use permit that would allow LCS to lease the addition at the Naz. I cannot express to you how much it means to us as a school to be located in Brighton. It would not only benefit LCS and LOTWA but also BAS.

My name is Jennine Raczkowski, and I am a mother of two girls who go to Light of the World Academy in Pinckney, Michigan. My girls have been going to this wonderful school for years and it was the best decision we ever decided to do for them. My daughters are 7 and 11, and love this school so much. We pulled our oldest daughter out of public school here in Pinckney after her third grade year. And my youngest daughter has been at LOTWA since preschool at age 3. Just so you understand, I do not go to the Naz church nor do I even really know where it is located. It was of no big deal to me, until now.

So moving on, I am sure you are now asking yourselves, why did she pull her daughter out of public school? Here is the crucial answer on why LOTWA means the world to us as a family. My oldest daughter learns differently. She has been professorially diagnosed with ADD after vigorous testing done by Dr. Sullivan, who has a private practice in Ann Arbor. 5 days for hours on end she went through this testing to see what was her exact issues. We didn't know. No one knew, not even teachers. She seems like a normal kid in every single way, except for a few things with her learning ability. She encounters learning issues when dealing with math. She needs small classroom sizes and more one on one attention than she was getting in a class of 36, whom had several children in the class needing full time aids. It was such a distraction for her, she couldn't focus and she was slipping between the cracks educationally in math. But in public school, if you don't get it when they are ready to move on, then you don't get it. When then contacted Kathy Moorehouse from LOTWA and she was more than thrilled to have Gwyneth join their school. And she flourished! The Montessori ways of teaching just work for her. They are essential in her understanding how to do math. We were so happy to get to bring her there and we would gladly deal with our cut backs financially for her sake.

Let me tell you, as a parent, I am so devastated by the outcome of the meetings so far regarding the special permit Livingston Christian has been trying to obtain to move into the Naz church in Brighton. Why do I care about Livingston Christian moving to Brighton? Well, because our school, Light of the World Academy was in a verbal agreement to buy the Livingston Christian School building for our new charter school to move into this fall. Since we are no longer going to be a private Montessori school, and are now going to be a charter public Montessori school, we needed a new building. And we, as a school, were so excited to embark on this new chapter! Why? Because I personally spend \$10,000 a year to send both girls there, and now it would be free. Thats a big financial burden, but we have been doing it gladly for years now. But more importantly, it is DIRE for our oldest daughter to remain in the teachings of the LOTWA Montessori methods. We can't just toss her in any old school. She would not do as well. And that, as a parent, is really scary to think about.

If Livingston Christian is not able to obtain a new building for their fall year, my daughter's school will most likely be forced to close down!! My name is Gayle Italia. My family resides in Genoa Township and I am writing you today in regards to the denial of the Special Use Permit for Livingston Christian Schools.

Your vote is having a direct impact not only on my child, who currently attends Light of the World Academy, but myself as well. I am one of the teachers at Light of the World Academy.

I understand that you, the Board, may not have had all the facts when voting. For example, this vote not only affected one school, but two. Light of the World Academy had planned to move into the building Livingston Christian planned to vacate. As an employee and parent of Light of the World Academy, the decision made by the board will end my son's educational career at Light of the World - the only school he has ever attended as well as my job as a teacher, where I've been employed for 9 years. Up until this vote it was our hope as teachers that we would be able to bring a tuition-free Montessori education to the families in the Pinckney area. With this vote our 160 currently enrolled students, faculty, and administration will no longer have a school or job in the fall. It is also my understanding that you have the ability to call a special meeting in the coming days to reverse this decision and I implore you to do so. With each passing day, we lose precious time required to open our school this fall. It is four short weeks away and there is much preparation to be done. In addition, this vote has also affected Livingston Christian school and their plans to open their school in the Brighton area. So, in addition to the Light of the World Academy students who will not have a school to attend in the fall you now have another student population equaling a total of 300 students without a school as well as the additional teachers and administrators left jobless.

All,

I learned this morning that there was an issue being brought to the Genoa Township Board regarding LCS' use of the Brighton Nazarene new addition. I also learned that the Board turned down the special use permit needed to allow the move. I am very concerned with this development for a couple reasons:

- This effects not only LCS but also another school, Light of the World Christian Academy, who were supposed to
 move into the old LCS location in Pinckney. Over 300 children and their families can be without a school as a
 result of this and dozens of teachers could lose their jobs.
- 2. My wife and I want our children to receive a private Christian education and had planned to send our son there this fall.

After spending eight years overseas my family and we moved back home in early 2014 and since that time have been looking for the right school. We finally found LCS last spring and were thrilled with the prospects of enrolling our son in the Fall. Further, we live right across the street in the Pine Creek Ridge subdivision so the new location at Brighton Nazarene fits our needs perfectly. The Board's decision is obviously a devastating blow to that plan.

Dear Members,

I prayerfully ask you to reconsider the special use permit for Livingston Christian. I understand that many hearts are breaking in Livingston County as parents are scrambling to figure out where there kids will attend school, and many staff members will be out of a job this fall.

There has been a lot of media surrounding this issue saying that the Genoa township board is "a bully" or that board want to show the people at the Naz "who's in charge" ect.

I choose to believe that you are genuinely concerned about the traffic and that is where the problem is. Livingston Christian School is not a big school. The total number of cars in the whole school is 80. The school has Staggered its start and end times so as to not conflict with Brighton High, middle, and elementary start times. We have a very detailed drop off and pick up procedural plan so there would be no backup on Brighton Road.

Further, I know that Traffic is counted throughout the year on Brighton Road. Each road is assigned a "class" (A,B,C...)depending on the number of cars, busy traffic times, etc. The addition of cars serving up to 250 students (which the school does not currently have, but could grow to include) and 30 staff members did not change the "class" of Brighton Road. In addition, the road, with a center turn lane, and the school's staggered start and pick-up times resulted in a report to the Liv. County Rd. Comm. stating traffic would not be impeded.

I beg you on behalf of Light of the World Academy & Livingston Christian Schools to please reconsider. That this email does not fall on deaf ears but that the information given will promt you to help our schools. My name is Nikki Haefner and I live at 5343 Edgewood Shores Drive, Howell, Michigan. I have two children, Madison and Gabe. They both attended Three Fires Elementary this past school year as 5th and 4th graders, respectively. My son, Gabe, had brain surgery when he was 19 months old and while he is not cognitively impaired (actually, he extremely smart) he is socially immature. He was constantly bullied this year. 4th graders were suspended and then allowed back the next day to continue on their bullying spree. My son has so much anxiety about attending Three Fires again this year, so we began reaching out to private schools and charter schools.

We were looking for a school with smaller classroom sizes and higher academic achievement. My name is Scott Panning, and I have been on the board of LCS for the past 5 years. My family lives in Hamburg Township, and we have 2 daughters, Morgen and Sloan, who are set to begin their 6th year at LCS. Morgen is a senior this year, and Sloan is a sophomore. Prior to that, they both attended LOTWA, which my wife, Jennifer, and I were instrumental in founding 15 years ago.

For the past 2 weeks, I have been <u>mistakenly</u> privately angry with the decisions of your Board. The <u>entire</u> blame for the current situation we find ourselves in rests squarely on the shoulders of the leadership of Brighton Nazarene Church.

Several months ago when LCS entered into a contract with The Naz to relocate our school to Brighton (a long time goal for LCS), we had no idea of the problems between The Naz, their neighbors, and Genoa Township. These issues did not come to our attention until we discovered that the project did not have the proper permitting and approval of Genoa Township. Again, The Naz is to blame for hiring a sub-standard architect and builder. Generally, permitting should be handled up front by the architect.

Even after growing up as the son of a Lutheran minister, I have come to loathe what I now call "church people". They are poor business people, and, evidently in this case, poor neighbors.

I sit here at my computer this morning with a heavy heart. Our current situation adversely effects 2 schools, approximately 320 students and hundreds of Livingston County families. Including staff, I imagine that up to 1000 people are negatively impacted.

I am writing to you this morning to humbly ask you to call a special meeting to reconsider your decision to deny. Time is of the essence, and though I realize it is not your problem, the date of your next regular meeting is too close to our planned September 8 opening. Our Board will most likely meet tonight to vote on moving back in to our building in Pinckney. While we have explored other options, there seem to be none available for either LCS or LOTWA. A vote to move back will be a huge step backward for our school, and most likely lead to LOTWA not having a building for their school.

While many people are understandably upset over these issues, I believe forgiveness is the answer. My promise to you is that if you reconsider our move to the Naz, and allow us to move to Brighton, The Naz will be a <u>better</u> neighbor because of the presence of our school. Please forward this to the Board Members. I am hearing rumors that there is a group trying to use political pressure and social media to overturn the decision made by the board.

I would like to thank you for the denial of the special use permit petition for LCS. I believe the decision should stand. I am a Christian, my children went to public, charter and Christian schools so this is not about the politics of that. The Naz is in a residentially zoned area on one of the busiest roads in brighton. The traffic studies did not take into account the total capacity of the building, they were based on 200 students and staff. The school plan to stagger start and end times to fit between high school times and Maltby times will just cause brighton road to be busy for a longer period without a quiet time during early rush hour time. There was no discussion about traffic impact during HS sporting events that will coincide with LCS sporting events. The school will be more than just the weekday events they marketed. There will be graduations, sporting events, conference, concerts etc. The board evaluated all factors associated with the petition and should be allowed to do what they feel is right for the community. I attended all but one of the planning commission meetings and there were several requests for information that the Naz could not provide. In November LCS advertised their move to the NAZ despite the fact that there had been no petition for the special use permit until February-mar time frame. Please ensure the board decision stands as issued. I was at all but one of the planning commission meetings and the failure of this petition rests solely on the petitioner for failing to present a viable plan to handle traffic and neighbor concerns about the potential Impact on the surrounding community. The failure for the schools (now including Light of the World Academy) to plan appropriately for the timing of a permit falls on them. The new "panic" and pressure to do this for the children is a manipulative move that falls squarely on the individuals and groups that did not do their homework on how to get things approved. When your board voted against the special use permit for Livingston Christian to move into the Brighton Church of the Nazarene this week, I don't believe you were aware that the existence of another school was going to be threatened by your decision. Light of the World Montessori School has been part of the ministry of Shalom Lutheran Church in Pinckney for, I believe, twelve years now. All that time they have met in a wing of Shalom. More than two years ago LOTWA began the process of seeking a charter from the state, and after exhaustive efforts, they were granted one.

Contingent upon becoming a charter school was the requirement that the facilities of the school building be brought up to state fire codes, a very expensive process. When It became apparent that Livingston Christian was going to vacate the old St. Mary's School, and that it was going to become available to LOTWA, plans to bring our church facility up to code were scrapped. We believe the Hand of God opened this door for LOTWA...

I'm sure your decision to deny Livingston Christian legal access to the Naz facility was made with the understanding that they would be able to remain at the old St. Mary's, end of story. What you need to know is that the very existence of LOTWA is dependent upon their ability to move into that very facility. For LOTWA there is no plan B.

The education of 120 children, the jobs of the entire teaching staff and administration, the educational expectations and plans of all the families involved, the countless number of hours of work to gain this charter status, indeed, the very existence of LOTWA, hang in the balance.

My name is Stacey O'Keefe. I am a parent of two boys who have attended Livingston Christian Schools for 9 years. I am also on staff at the school, teaching high school English to grades 9, 10 and 12.

Livingston Christian Schools is so much more than just a building full of teachers and administrators that educate and prepare students for higher education. It is a family, where people live out their faith together, raising and training children to be godly people, serving each other and the community in which we reside. As happy as we have been to be a part of the Pinckney community for the last 9 years, a move to Brighton would broaden our horizons, giving us the ability to welcome families that are not able to travel to our Pinckney location due to a lack of expressways servicing that area. Our decision to attempt to move to Brighton was not an easy one, as we have formed many bonds with local businesses and families in Pinckney throughout our years there. Our secondary students have enjoyed serving the Pinckney seniors each year at various luncheons held at the senior center and also our neighbors during our fall and spring clean up days, when neighbors are invited to contact the school so we can meet needs like yard clean up and painting projects. Our students head up several other service projects each year, like delivering cookies to our local fire department, police post and downtown businesses to thank them for all they do to make Pinckney a wonderful town.

Although we knew it would be hard to move on, we felt it was best for the longevity of our school. We wish to make a new home in Brighton and would love the opportunity to serve that community as we have served the community of Pinckney.

I have been in attendance at the Genoa Township planning commission meetings and also the Genoa Township board meetings at which the special land use permit for the Brighton Nazarene Church to house our school has been discussed, recommended for approval, and denied. I respect the boards that serve the Genoa Township community and I know that your job is not easy. The commitment you have made to serve your community is commendable, as I am sure you spend countless hours diligently working to meet the needs of your community by making decisions that positively impact the people who live in Genoa Township. As you can probably understand, our school families are devastated by your decision to deny the church's request for a special land use permit that would allow us to move to the Brighton Nazarene Church. I am especially disappointed that the main reason given for this denial was traffic concerns. I know from attending the planning commission meetings that at least 2 separate traffic studies were conducted, citing no traffic concerns, and a representative from the Livingston County Road Commission was pleased with the method to which the studies were conducted and the results of each study. The church was also asked to provide a detailed plan for drop off and pick up procedures. The detailed presentation of those procedures clearly proved that the traffic on Brighton Road would not be impeded at any time. These procedures pleased the planning commission, resulting in a 4-1 vote, favoring a recommendation to your board to approve the special land use permit. I can only conclude that your board was not given this information, as you cited that the major concern was traffic.

Because it is within your power, I am asking you to reconsider your decision to deny the special land use permit and to review all of the studies and information that were submitted to the planning commission. It is within your power to call for another vote and I am asking you to do that. The future of our students and their families rest in your due diligence to review all of the information, weigh it carefully and realize that a traffic issue is not a concern. I ask that you not only look for reasons to deny the permit, but to imagine the positive impact that Livingston Christian Schools would have on the community of Brighton for the same reasons we have been a blessing to the community of Pinckney. I would also ask you to weigh the impact of your decision on 200 students and their families who love their school and the devastation it would cause them to have to say goodbye to a ministry that has been a beacon for 29 years in Livingston County.

I anxiously await your timely response. Thank you for your reconsideration on a very important decision.

Dear members of the Genoa Township Board:

My name is Matt Eiszler. I am the father of a wonderful daughter that has been extremely excited all summer that she will be a kindergartner this upcoming school year at Light of the World Academy. She talks about it constantly. Quite frankly, I've not seen a kid this excited about school in my life. In fact, I can confidently say the same can be said about every kid that goes to LOTWA. It truly is remarkable to see it first hand.

My daughter has been enrolled in the pre-school program for the last two years (half days 3 days a week). There are many, many truly incredible things about LOTWA. Way too many to list everything. But I will tell you about the one that noticed right away and stands out to me over everything else. Every kid that goes to LOTWA actually enjoys going to school and enjoys learning. Every kid. Yes, every single kid. My father taught teacher education for nearly 40 years and my mother worked in the public school system while I was growing up. Because of that, I've been around schools most of my life and I've never seen anything like what I see at LOTWA. It really is amazing.

I would love for my daughter to be able to have the experience that LOTWA offers. That dream was easily attainable until I learned of the vote that you turned down the Brighton Nazarene Church and Livingston Christian Schools. We do not have the luxury of being able to send our daughter to another school for kindergarten next year. She turns 5 on November 3rd. Michigan changed the laws about when a child can start kindergarten a few years ago. This year, a child has to turn 5 by (if I remember right) September 1st to be able to start kindergarten. There is a small loophole in that if the child turns 5 between September 1st and December 1st that they can go to kindergarten as long as the parents sign a waiver. This waiver has to be filed with the school by June 1st (over 2 months ago). We did that with LOTWA. We did not do this anywhere else for two reasons. 1. We don't really want our daughter to go anywhere else. and 2. We quite frankly didn't see this coming at all. I don't think anyone did. So at this point if a re-vote doesn't happen, we will have no other choice than to enroll our daughter in a 3rd year of pre-school, which costs a lot of money.

I'm sorry this is so long, but there is one more thing I would like to mention as I think it's extremely important and stands to the grace and generosity of LOTWA and the families of the children that attend the school. On November 10th of last year my wife was diagnosed with a Basilar Tip Brian Aneurysm. I remember the day well. It was my birthday and we actually made 2 trips to the ER that day. It was a day that I won't forget. Luckily, the aneurysm had not ruptured. Unluckily, it happened to be in an extremely rare and difficult spot to get at. To top it off it also had a wide neck opening, which is not good when dealing with aneurysms. The neurosurgeons at U of M made 3 attempts to fix it. After the 1st surgery back in December, my wife woke up with severe vision problems. She only saw half of everything. Half of a cup, half of a person...etc. And in the half that she could see, she said everything looked like a Picasso painting. During the 1st surgery, they managed to get 1 stent in place, but it wasn't enough to hold the coils (they occlude the aneurysm) in place. They tried to place a second stent, but they weren't able to get it in. The second surgery back in March, they tried for 6 hours to place the second stent. They had 3 neurosurgeons and none of them could get the stent in. Combined, these 3 neurosurgeons have treated over 1,000 patients. And finally at the end of June on the 3rd attempt, after almost another 6 hours, they just barely were able to get a second highly

specialized stent in place so they could fill the aneurysm with coils. After this 3rd round I asked the surgeon how often he runs into a case like my wife's. He said, "If you work at a hospital that doesn't teach, you don't". So then I asked him how often you run into a case like this at a hospital that teaches. He said "Maybe once or twice in a career". To say my wife has been through the ringer this past year would be an understatement. And she's still got somewhat of a rough road ahead. But we can finally see the finish line in the distance.

I told you this story not for sympathy. I told you this because of one thing that has been wonderful and humbling at the same time. And that is the kindness and generosity that LOTWA and the families of LOTWA have shown my family. Whether it was watching our daughter longer at school while my wife and I went to doctors appointments, or making dinner for us, or finding a cleaning lady to come and clean up for us every so often, or just plain old listening to us rant; it is something that simply can't be measured. That is the type of environment I want my daughter to see and be a part of as she grows up and learns.

As it stands now, that wonderful environment is pretty much going to be torn to shreds. But I have been told, you have the power to change your vote. I urge you to do so. There are literally hundreds of families that are dependent on it.

To the members of the Genoa Township Board,

Thank you so much for the time and effort you have poured into the decision of whether or not to grant a Special Use Permit to The Brighton Nazarene Church for Livingston Christian School. I understand that you have all spent countless hours studying data and information regarding the possibility of the permit and have made your decision based on what you believe is best for the township and it's residents.

However, I write to you this evening to express my concern regarding the decision to deny the permit. From what I've read and researched, as well as what I've heard from attending some of the recent township meetings, is that the topmost concern with LCS moving into The Naz building is the impact it will have on Brighton Rd traffic. I know others have recently brought it up, but I wanted to mention that although LCS may have an enrollment of approximately 150 students, the number of vehicles that travel to and from the school each day is grossly less than 150. If you studied the travel impact of the school on the roads in and around it's location in Pinckney, you would see that throughout the day, there were approximately 20-30 cars parked at the school that belonged to staff and the few high school students that drove. Many of those teachers and students also drove multiple school-age children to the school. At pick-up and drop off, the number of cars pulling into the school parking lot was never over 30-40 more vehicles, arrived at staggered times between 8-8:15, and again from 3:15-3:30. There was never an incident where the school imposed traffic backups or incidences on D19 from large influxes of cars. The arrival and departure of students was always smooth and without congestion on main Pinckney streets. I confidently believe that the families of the school would not pose a negative or measurable impact on the flow of traffic on Brighton Rd either. The parking lot at The Naz is large and allows ample room for safe loading and unloading of students, as well as room for a queue for waiting vehicles.

I, as well as the many other families within the Livingston Christian School body, humbly ask that you look again at the traffic flow and impact studies concerning the school. Please look again at how little impact a very staggered arrival time of approximately (at most) 50-70 vehicles would have on Brighton Rd.

My husband and I love Livingston Christian School and feel strongly that it is where our kids should be. The Brighton location is an ideal location geographically and for future school growth, and we pray that LCS will be granted the ability to partner with The Naz to use their building. Thank you so much for considering my letter and for listening to my observations and comments. Thank you also for your dedication to Genoa Township, and to us, it's residents.

It has come to my attention that you have made a decision this week about Livingston Christian that will leave my two grandchildren without a school. I am at a loss and completely saddened by this news. Light of The World Academy has been an amazing experience for my grandson. Add a toddler and a preschooler, he was not receptive to writing whatsoever. He refused to write or use a pencil or a pen. Had he been enrolled in a public school, he would have been forced to write, most likely cultivating a further hatred of writing. The way they went about it, I was nervous it wouldn't work, but I was amazed how receptive he was to their method and he now even likes to write. I'm not sure that this will help but I think it is important that you know how important Light of the World Academy is to my family.

I am a single mother of two children that attend LOTWA. We started going there two years ago because my son was having terrible sensory issues and wasn't doing well in his public school kindergarten classroom. The school he went to was a wonderful school, it just was too overwhelming for him. LOTWA was our last resort to try to find something that would work for him. I never planned to put my kids in a private school. Once he was there though he thrived. I then couldn't even comprehend not giving my older daughter the same opportunity and then enrolled her there the following year.

What I didn't expect was the the love and support we found at LOTWA. At the time, I was going through a divorce and the staff and teachers there ended up being the rock I didn't know we all would need. I have struggled and have done everything I could to pay tuition to keep my children at this school. So you can imagine my excitement when we found out LOTWA was going to become a charter school and I knew I would be able to keep my kids in this safe haven.

Since finding out that we may no longer have a school for this Fall, I have been sick. Dear Members of the Genoa Township Board:

My name is Jessica Barefield. I am a parent of 2 children who attend Light of The World Academy (LOTWA) in Pinckney, Michigan (Connor will be in first grade and Olivia will be in pre-K). This will be our third year at LOTWA. It has been a financial burden to keep Connor in LOTWA and we have only been able to afford it by placing him there part-time the last two years. My husband suffered a job loss and we have had a terrible time getting back on our feet, but the school where we sent our children was a top priority for us and we chose to give up several luxuries to be able to be part of this amazing institution. We have been biding our time, hoping, and praying for the Charter to take effect so that we could stay there for our children's elementary education. We cannot afford a full-time tuition. We were thrilled that the Charter was to take effect this year allowing us the good fortune of keeping Connor there for first grade as well as both our

children for subsequent grades. It really was a blessing to have the opportunity and the choice to keep our children in a school that cultivates not only their minds, but also their hearts and souls. They not only teach my child reading, writing, and arithmetic, but they teach him about love. They teach him about the less fortunate and how important it is to give to others that have less then him. They enrich my child's mind and soul. They make him, Olivia, and my husband and I feel loved, accepted, and important. LOTWA is not just a school, but it is a second home for many of us and our children. In public school my child would finish kindergarten needing to be able to count to 30. My kindergartner could count well past 100. That was because of LOTWA. It is my understanding that public schools have a list of criteria that children must meet at the end of each grade to test into the next grade. If you compare LOTWA's requirements to what a public school requires, the list that LOTWA requires far surpasses public school requirements. I want that for my child. I want him to be able to count to 100 and not just 30. They are teaching my child superior thinking. They are teaching him to succeed in education in a way that most schools would not require a 6 year old to think.

Another reason we love LOTWA is because they also cater to each individual student. In a public school, your child is one of at least 30 students all sitting at a desk in the same classroom learning the exact same curriculum in the exact same way. LOTWA "KNOWS" their children. They know what makes them think, what makes them want to learn, what is a hindrance for them, what their strengths and weaknesses are, and they use all of that to custom create a way of teaching that make each individual child want to lean and to succeed at learning. For example, some of the students love music so the teachers try to incorporate that in their curriculum to get them actively involved and excited in the learning process. Connor has a very active imagination and advanced verbal skills, so they use that to their advantage and allow him to incorporate those two attributes in his learning process. I could go on-and-on with examples. Bottom line, if a particular way of learning is not working for any given student, they find a new way to teach that student so that they actually learn the material and like learning the material. You do not get that in a public school.

I also want to touch base on the 'family' aspect of LOTWA a bit more. This is not just a school. My youngest, Olivia, has not attended LOTWA yet and she will be there this fall for her first year. Back in April we found out my dad had cancer and then the day of his cancer surgery in May, by grandmother unexpectedly passed away. The funeral was to be held on a Tuesday and I had nowhere for Olivia to go. All of my family was going to be at the funeral and my High School sitters were in school themselves. I was talking to Kathy Moorehouse about my dad and my grandma and I began crying because I did not want to take my 3 year old to a funeral and have her see all of us vividly upset. Kathy hugged me and said, "You will bring her here". I was shocked. I initially declined. I told Kathy, "This is a school, not a daycare. She will

interrupt your curriculum." She said, "I don't want to hear another word about it. We are all like extended family here. Family helps family and you need help, so we will help you. Pack her lunch and bring her here on Tuesday. Don't give it a second thought. You go be with your family and grieve your grandmother. Olivia will be in good hands with us." I still cry just thinking about it. What school do you know that would take a child that was not their student for a whole 8 hour day so a parent could attend their grandmother's funeral? The answer in LOTWA. I don't know any other school that would do that and surely not a public school. It is one of the kindest gestures I have ever experienced and I will remember it always and will be forever grateful to Kathy, Sandy, and Chris for taking care of my baby for the day so I could say goodbye to my grandmother.

I implore you, I beseech you, I BEG YOU. Please, please, PLEASE reconsider your decision against allowing Livingston Christian a Special Use Permit in Genoa Township. If they cannot move, we cannot move. If we cannot move, LOTWA will have to close their doors after 13 years. Over 100 students will be without a school. Dozens of teachers will be without a job. Your current decision is gravely impacting so many lives. Please, I am speaking to the parent in you. What if just a month before school started, a school you love and call your second home, you were told the doors might close and your child would be without a school or need to find a new school that will pale in comparison to your current school? I am speaking to the worker in you. How would you feel if one little vote caused you to lose your job and the income that helps support your family? You can change this. You can make this right. I know you are concerned about traffic, but 200 student does NOT equal 200 cars. Many of those students have siblings. Like me for example. I have 2 children. That doesn't mean that two cars drop them off at school. One car drops them off at school. Then there is carpooling. I know a lot a kids carpool with other parents. I will say it again, 200 children does NOT equal 200 cars. Plus Livingston Christian was planning a staggered drop off, making even less vehicles coming and going at the same time. I want to leave you a video of my Connor. He has no idea that this is happening. I do not want to cause him undo stress. I decided to take a video of him tonight asking him "hypothetical" questions about LOTWA. Look at his eyes. Look at how they light up. He loves his school. That in and of itself is huge. I have friends with children Connor's age that attend public school and I have asked them questions about their teacher and their school. Their faces do not light up like this. If you don't believe me, test the theory. I guarantee you, you will not see this same reaction. You can almost see my son's heart smiling. Please don't break my child's heart. Please rethink what you decision means for so many of us.

Genoa Township Board Members,

We are parents of three Livingston Christian Schools students this fall. This will be our fifth year at LCS and we were so excited to have the opportunity to move to Brighton. Yes, this will be a farther drive considering we live in Pinckney and school was going to start earlier from my understanding, but the opportunity and potential growth that could occur far outweighs the other factors.

I won't admit to knowing all the facts or attending any board meetings, but I am aware that traffic is a concern. I just looked at our enrollment list for the 2015 - 2016 year and we have 104 families enrolled. In addition to 31 staff members, nine of which have students that attend the school. That calculates to be 126 families. Most likely this means less than 126 cars because many families carpool.

I glanced at the websites of the closest Brighton schools and it showed the following times:

Brighton High School - 7:25-2:25

Maltby - 8:30 - 3:31

Hornung - 8:47- 3:50

I believe that LCS was planning on adjusting our start time by 15 minutes to help traffic with Maltby. They were planning on 8:00 - 3:07. This seems like a reasonable amount of time to allow parents and buses arriving and leaving from drop off and pick up.

Also, according to

https://www.mischooldata.org/DistrictSchoolProfiles/StudentInformation/StudentCounts/StudentCount.aspx Brighton Area Schools enrollment is down from previous years. It had over 1000 more students back in the early 2000's (last year 6,002 verses 7296 in 03-04). This included an additional 250 students at Brighton High School and almost 150 more at Maltby. This wasn't a horrible situation back then and it included 400 more students at the same time periods of drop off and pick up. With this data, I truly believe our time difference and number of students would NOT significantly effect traffic.

I was highly disappointed when the Special Use Permit was denied. I have some concerns about how we are going to adjust our plans to fit back into that the building. Would the new 4th grade teacher be fired and we'd return to a 3/4 split because we didn't have enough room for a 4th grade classroom? If a split class happens again this year it directly effects my family because my son is in 3rd grade this year. I believe two separate classrooms would benefit the students tremendously and prevent firing this newly hired teacher. However, I don't believe our Pinckney building can accommodate that.

After hearing about yesterday's meeting on WHMI's website, I am deeply concerned about the effect this has on Light of the World Academy. I know several students that attend this school, one of which was at LCS, and the montessori style of education works best for them. They excel there and would not in a traditional setting. I

hate to even imagine the school being closed and those students needing to find new schools. How devastating for the staff and families at LOTWA.

It sounds as though things may not have been done exactly right or timely or something with Brighton Naz, but please hear the concerns of the families of the LCS and LOTWA. Both are greatly effected by the recent vote and I believe that you could fix this devastating situation. Please reach out to the schools and talk with their boards. They are the ones that are truly being effected.

To the members of the Genoa Township Board:

My name is Carole Stiles, and I'm the high school math teacher at Livingston Christian Schools in Pinckney. My husband & I have attended most of the planning commission meetings regarding our school & the Brighton Nazarene Church. We also were in attendance at the Township Board meeting last night.

I would like to go on record as saying I'm profoundly disappointed that the Board voted to deny the Special Use Permit for Livingston Christian Schools. This decision impacted not only the students, families and staff from Livingston Christian, but the students, families and staff from Light of the World Academy, as well. LOTWA was planning on moving into the old Livingston Christian building in Pinckney, but in order for us to vacate that building, we need to find a home in the Brighton area first.

So your vote last night impacted not one school, but two. There are now more than 300 students combined - many of whom live in Genoa Township - who are potentially without a school for the fall, and their families are devastated. In addition, several dozen teachers at both schools will lose their jobs if the schools can't open.

In the case of Livingston Christian our parents are certainly devastated. Our school is a non-denominational religious school that allows our students to worship freely while receiving a first rate education. This is something that they cannot get in the public school environment. Our hope was to partner with the ministry of the Brighton Nazarene Church as we have the same goals in mind: to see lives transformed and to love lost and hurting people. If you could see what I see every day in our school, the way students lives are changed, and not just academically, you would be amazed. Our seniors this past spring decided to spend their "senior skip day" reaching out to their community, loving on the less fortunate, & encouraging the broken hearted in our county. Why wouldn't you want that in your township? Our hope to grow and bring the blessing of our school to a bigger community hinged on being housed at BNC. Your decision last night ripped that hope away from our families, and they're crushed.

I know you have it in your legal ability to call a special meeting in the next few days to change this decision, on the grounds that you didn't have all the facts in front of you when you made your decision.

I know that traffic is the main concern of those who voted against the school. In speaking with several Board members after the meeting, though, they said they were not aware of all the facts of how Livingston Christian would impact traffic on Brighton Road. Specifically, the Board might not have been aware of these facts:

- Even if Livingston Christian were to reach its full capacity of 250 students, that in no way means that 250 cars would be showing up at the school all at the same time to drop off and pick up their children.
- First, 250 students means about half that many cars because of siblings and car pools. A traffic study by Fleis & Vandenbrink dated June 23, 2015, and given to the Planning Commission projects 127 pick-ups for a total enrollment of 250. In my experience as a teacher at LCS for 16 years, it would probably be even less than that.

- In addition, Livingston Christian was planning on doing a staggered drop-off and pick-up - another fact I don't believe the board was aware of. A staggered drop-off and pick-up would mean a maximum of maybe 20 cars showing up every 3-4 minutes during those times. There's no question that Brighton Road could handle that traffic flow.

We remain stunned and perplexed that the Township Board denied the Special Use Permit, especially since the Planning Commission approved it on a 6-1 vote, and numerous traffic studies confirmed it wouldn't be a problem.

I certainly appreciate that as elected officials, your duty is to your constituents. Those who voted against the Special Use Permit thought they were doing the right thing because of traffic concerns, but they didn't have all the facts.

The fate of 300-some students and families now rests in your hands - along with the dozens of local teachers and other staff members who will lose their jobs.

I urge and implore you to make this a priority - to deal with it today, immediately. Schedule a special meeting, and take another vote on the grounds that you didn't have access to all the facts. This can't wait <u>until tomorrow</u>. It can't wait until this afternoon. You have to do this now.

You have the chance to make this right, and be a hero in the eyes of all those students and parents who are hoping upon hope that they'll have access to the school of their choice this fall. Please do the right thing.

In my experience as a school director for 13 years, it would probably be even less than that.
- In addition, Livingston Christian was planning on doing a staggered drop-off and pick-up another fact I don't believe the board was aware of. A staggered drop-off and pick-up would mean a maximum of maybe 20 cars showing up every 3-4 minutes during those times. There's no question that Brighton Road could handle that traffic flow.

We remain stunned and perplexed that the Township Board denied the Special Use Permit, especially since the Planning Commission approved it on a 4-1 vote, and numerous traffic studies confirmed it wouldn't be a problem.

I certainly appreciate that as elected officials, your duty is to your constituents. Those who voted against the Special Use Permit thought they were doing the right thing because of traffic concerns, but they didn't have all the facts.

The fate of 300-some students and families now rests in your hands - along with the dozens of local teachers and other staff members who will lose their jobs.

I urge and implore you to make this a priority - to deal with it today, immediately. Schedule a special meeting, and take another vote on the grounds that you didn't have access to all the facts. This can't wait until tomorrow. It can't wait until this afternoon. You have to do this now.

You have the chance to make this right, and be a hero in the eyes of all those students and parents who are hoping upon hope that they'll have access to the school of their choice this fall. Please do the right thing.

The fate of 300-some students and families now rests in your hands - along with the dozens of local teachers and other staff members who will lose their jobs.

I urge and implore you to make this a priority - to deal with it today, immediately. Schedule a special meeting, and take another vote on the grounds that you didn't have access to all the facts. This can't wait until tomorrow. It can't wait until this afternoon. You have to do this now.

You have the chance to make this right, and be a hero in the eyes of all those students and parents who are hoping upon hope that they'll have access to the school of their choice this fall. Please do the right thing.

To the members of the Genoa Township Board:

My name is Carole Stiles, and I'm the high school math teacher at Livingston Christian Schools in Pinckney. My husband & I have attended most of the planning commission meetings regarding our school & the Brighton Nazarene Church. We also were in attendance at the Township Board meeting last night.

I would like to go on record as saying I'm profoundly disappointed that the Board voted to deny the Special Use Permit for Livingston Christian Schools. This decision impacted not only the students, families and staff from Livingston Christian, but the students, families and staff from Light of the World Academy, as well. LOTWA was planning on moving into the old Livingston Christian building in Pinckney, but in order for us to vacate that building, we need to find a home in the Brighton area first.

So your vote last night impacted not one school, but two. There are now more than 300 students combined - many of whom live in Genoa Township - who are potentially without a school for the fall, and their families are devastated. In addition, several dozen teachers at both schools will lose their jobs if the schools can't open.

In the case of Livingston Christian our parents are certainly devastated. Our school is a non-denominational religious school that allows our students to worship freely while receiving a first rate education. This is something that they cannot get in the public school environment. Our hope was to partner with the ministry of the Brighton Nazarene Church as we have the same goals in mind: to see lives transformed and to love lost and hurting people. If you could see what I see every day in our school, the way students lives are changed, and not just academically, you would be amazed. Our seniors this past spring decided to spend their "senior skip day" reaching out to their community, loving on the less fortunate, & encouraging the broken hearted in our county. Why wouldn't you want that in your township? Our hope to grow and bring the blessing of our school to a bigger community hinged on being housed at BNC. Your decision last night ripped that hope away from our families, and they're crushed.

I know you have it in your legal ability to call a special meeting in the next few days to change this decision, on the grounds that you didn't have all the facts in front of you when you made your decision.

I know that traffic is the main concern of those who voted against the school. In speaking with several Board members after the meeting, though, they said they were not aware of all the facts of how Livingston Christian would impact traffic on Brighton Road. Specifically, the Board might not have been aware of these facts:

Dear Genoa Township Board:

My name is Dan Wholihan. I am a lifelong Livingston County resident and a current resident of Genoa Township where I have spent a total of 25 years. I wear many different hats in our community, and am mostly known for being the current Chair of Livingston County Republicans. I speak as a Cunningham Lake resident and not in my chair capacity here. However in my position, I receive phone calls and emails about matters in our community, including members of my party who have asked for my help. After attending many township board meetings, reading the packets, and talking to individuals in my community, I feel compelled to write to you and the township Planning Commission.

I first would like to thank Trustee Jim Mortensen and the rest of the Planning Commission who did a very good job addressing the issues that need to be taken care of with The Brighton Church of the Nazarene (The Naz) hosting the school. There are issues The Naz needs to resolve and that was made clear. On that same note, Trustee Jim Mortensen, along with Clerk Polly Skolarus and Treasurer Robin Hunt saw the big picture and did not punish two schools in our county for a dispute involving a third party. I thank all three of you for doing the right thing here.

The traffic impact was deemed minimal by the LC Road Commission, which is as close to an independent source as you will find. I am no stranger to Brighton Road as it is the main road to my neighborhood. The school understands the Brighton High/Maltby/Hornung start/close times and is adjusting to that. In addition Latson alleviated much of the SE Genoa to Howell commuter traffic away from eastern Brighton Road. The other matters including buffer zones between The Naz and Worden Lake are issues that can (and should) be fixed. In fact, I'm sure many of the parents and students of the new school will be willing to help with the fixes if that really is the issue. The school and the required fixes should be an either/or operation. Good leadership would make both things happen.

The actions of four Township Board of Trustees did not punish The Naz. They punished and traumatized parents, teachers, and kids for actions outside of their control. Some of those punished live here in our township. That's not right. This made the news for several days, and I've received calls and correspondence about this. It's now a lawsuit. Our community should be in the news for being a good and welcoming place to live and do business, not for traumatizing kids, parents, and teachers. When these four township officials

override the planning commission and cause my township to make the news for denying a school, whether it be good intentions or not, it embarrasses my township, my community, my county, and my party. All seven board members who ran for office ran as Republicans. There is a responsibility that comes with running under that banner. Republicans are supposed to be for limited government, school choice, and good leadership. Good leadership would approve the school, while at the same time making sure the appropriate issues regarding the church are resolved. As GOP Chair, If I can keep the tea party, traditional center-right conservatives like myself, social conservative/fiscal moderates and fiscal conservative/social moderates together in our county, our board can approve the school and make sure the Naz are also good neighbors. This does not have to be an either/or matter.

It isn't too late for our trustees to fix this problem. As board members, I encourage you to reverse its decision and to approve the plan approved by your commission. Is "killing the school" what Supervisor Gary McCririe or Trustee Jean Ledford want as their legacy of their long service to our township? Is "killing the school" what Trustees Todd Smith or Linda Rowell want as a shadow over them if they want to replace Supervisor McCririe when he retires? A lot of this can be avoided with reconsideration of this issue and a reversal of the board's decision.

I would like to provide a simple analysis of the traffic study as submitted with the special use request of the Church of the Nazarene. I know some of you had a gut feeling that there would be an impact on traffic yet the studies implied minimal impact. I have done some simple analysis of the traffic study and found a significant flaw in the data used. As we all know with computer models and math equations, garbage in garbage out. My purpose for writing this is to help all of us understand that there will be more of an impact than the study indicates. Please take this as a vote of confidence on the denial and hopefully the whole lawsuit thing can go away for other reasons. I know Eric has had to recuse himself but maybe he can collaborate my interpretation of the report.

The memo dated June 23, 2015, from Fleis & Vandenbrink projects (page 2 of the report) 127 pick-ups for the future student enrollment of This may be an accurate projection for the drop off and pick up process to determine if the parking lot can handle the flow however the impact on Brighton Road is based on flawed data. That same projection indicates 180 total ingress. To determine how the current enrollment driving patterns would relate to the future enrollment they used enrollment of 134 plus 18 staff. With those numbers they determined of 71 drop off and pick up cycles. This is a fact that does not include the 12 student drivers and 18 staff. There are in fact 101 vehicles involved during a normal day at the school. 101 cars divided by 152 students+staff = .665 cars per individual. They used of 71 as a baseline for the traffic issue is faulty. A more accurate baseline needs to include the total vehicle count as it pertains to the overall impact on Brighton road and the parking lot ability to support this use. With the proposed increase to 250 students and 32 staff a more accurate indication of traffic flow should be run using 187 (282 times .665 as in the earlier calculation) vehicles. The model they used for the study assumed 127 (their number) vehicles. If 187 (or even the 180 the trip generation program indicates) is placed into the model I suspect there would be a drastically different impact study. Their focus on ingress

and egress for the drop off and pick up plan caused them to miss the need to access the total impact on Brighton road traffic. I believe running the model with 127 cars is far from realistic for a school population that has 282 total occupants plus the church staff and members that may happen to show up at the busy times. This modeling process assumes the only use of the facility is the school and as such does not include any church related traffic during the critical time periods.

Please trust in your thoughts and concerns for the community as a whole and do not let the intimidation of a group who did not plan for contingency allow you to doubt yourselves. Those of you who voted for the petition will hopefully understand that there has been some data interpretation that may have been faulty. I am not implying any malice in the process. I believe the report was developed to help create a flow for the parking area and as such I think it has merit and there was no data included for church activity during the critical times. Again, garbage in garbage out. Thankyou for your time and consideration.

I would like to thank you for the denial of the special use permit petition for LCS. I believe the decision should stand. I am a Christian, my children went to public, charter and Christian schools so this is not about the politics of that. The Naz is in a residentially zoned area on one of the busiest roads in brighton. The traffic studies did not take into account the total capacity of the building, they were based on 200 students and staff. The school plan to stagger start and end times to fit between high school times and Maltby times will just cause brighton road to be busy for a longer period without a quiet time during early rush hour time. There was no discussion about traffic impact during HS sporting events that will coincide with LCS sporting events. The school will be more than just the weekday events they marketed. There will be graduations, sporting events, conference, concerts etc. The board evaluated all factors associated with the petition and should be allowed to do what they feel is right for the community. I attended all but one of the planning commission meetings and there were several requests for information that the Naz could not provide. In November LCS advertised their move to the NAZ despite the fact that there had been no petition for the special use permit until February-mar time frame. Please ensure the board decision stands as issued. I was at all but one of the planning commission meetings and the failure of this petition rests solely on the petitioner for failing to present a viable plan to handle traffic and neighbor concerns about the potential Impact on the surrounding community. The failure for the schools (now including Light of the World Academy) to plan appropriately for the timing of a permit falls on them. The new "panic" and pressure to do this for the children is a manipulative move that falls squarely on the individuals and groups that did not do their homework on how to get things approved. Please help ensure the decision stands and do not allow the special use permit to be issued.
